Questions from the Elections Committee:

What do you see as key issues facing MLA?

Costs – Many librarians are facing financial stressors: library budgets have been flat or decreasing, library support for travel is limited, and librarian salaries are flat. This means that librarians face hard choices and are becoming more and more sensitive to price increases – particularly when it comes to attending meetings. MLA needs to consider alternatives to an annual meeting that lasts from Saturday afternoon until Wednesday.

Diversity – Librarianship is still a predominantly white profession. MLA needs to work with its membership to make sure that it is not only welcoming people of color, but actively working to encourage their participation in shaping the organization and profession, and listening to them. The same holds true for librarians who are differently-abled, for trans librarians, and any other librarians who have been marginalized by the systemic whiteness of the profession.

Education – MLA needs to continue to work at providing continuing educational opportunities that are both high quality and budget friendly. Content needs to address needs of medical librarians across the professional life cycle. Some of this is being addressed with the new education plan, but more needs to be done.

Raison d'être – For too many medical librarians, MLA exists only to put on an annual meeting. MLA needs to be explicit about how it provides value to each practicing medical librarian. Headway has been made in this area, but more needs to be done.

How will you learn what your member colleagues want and need from the association and how will you help them get involved in addressing these issues?

There's really only one way to learn what people want – ask them. This can be done through established channels - chapters, sections, and special interest groups attend to the needs of members and then share that information. It can also be done through conversations both formal and informal. Being open to hearing about both the not-so-great and the great aspects of the organization helps encourage those conversations.

As for getting people involved in addressing issues, that's really asking how to get people involved in MLA. I find that a person to person approach is the most successful. I first became more active in MLA because someone I knew personally invited me. I think that's true of a lot of people – they need to know that their participation is welcome and they need to be encouraged. I'd like to see that continue and grow.
