A couple of years ago I surveyed a number of supervisors in five hospitals in Wyoming. Although I focused on whether our students were prepared to search for information after leaving UW, I also wanted to know what resources were used in the state. Two of the hospitals had libraries (One has since been closed) and three did not have libraries.

The hospitals with libraries had, as expected, a substantial budget for databases and electronic and print subscriptions. The supervisors and their staff relied heavily on the librarian and the resources. They also were more familiar with resources that were available to them without charge. All ILLs were directed through the librarian, who utilized Free Share and other groups that would share resources.

The Hospitals without libraries had access to fewer resources, as expected. Specific departments purchased access to one subscription, such as LexiComp for pharmacy and one hospital had CINAHL for nursing. They might have access to Up-to-Date for physicians and Micromedex was also in use. One hospital pharmacy department were aware of, and using databases available through WYLD, a library consortium that provides databases through public and academic libraries. We have Cochrane and a few nursing databases. That department also used PubMed. The other two hospitals were unaware of the databases they could access at no charge, both through the state and NLM. They did not use PubMed, but relied on other sources, such as MedlinePlus. When an article was wanted, someone in the hospital (no one knew quite who that person was) would purchase the article directly from the publisher. They did not know about Loansome Doc, which would be available through Coe Library at UW.

Surprisingly, all the supervisors answered immediately that evidence based practice was used in their hospital.

Although this was only five hospitals in a very rural state with a small population, I would be surprised if access to information was much different in other hospitals without libraries.

I know there must be a correlation between a professionally staffed medical library in a hospital that is actually used by the clinical and managerial staff and better outcomes, patient safety, ROI. MLA is currently putting together teams of librarians to conduct systematic reviews to provide such evidence. I have volunteered to service on one of the systematic renew teams.

Hospital libraries have closed in my area over the past few years, many hospital librarian positions have been eliminated upon being vacated for one reason or another, and many hospital librarians who still have jobs are no longer working full-time. I see this as not just a local problem but a national issue that will indeed impact the quality of care in the USA.

My employer, the largest teaching hospital in the area, closed its long term 8,000 square foot library facility located in a prominent spot at the hospital to repurpose the space for non-clinical personnel offices and relocated the library to a 2,500 sq. ft. facility off campus. Only 10% of the print collection was moved, the rest was disposed of, and library daily average visits dropped from 200 to 20. In addition, there was a 50% staff reduction - one librarian position out of two and one library technician position out of two were eliminated. I am the surviving librarian and am struggling to keep up with the workload that comes with what was once close to a university level library operation. Not a day goes by when we don't get a request for an article that was in the portion of the discarded print collection. No additional funding was provided to replace the discarded print with online archives. The reduction in staff came with a significantly reduced budget which required the elimination of parts of the online collection. We are still a Net Docline Lender but can no longer lend the volume that we once could which is definitely impacting the access to knowledge-based information for many other hospitals around the country. This library is in a sorry state and the hospital management does not get it. I did present a 255% ROI for the calendar year 2011 to no avail. I am once again trying to get a system-wide online library established since my employer is part of a 6-hospital system. My past attempts have failed because the other hospitals claimed they were only community hospitals so did not need to increase library resources or services (there is only one other hospital in the system with a librarian who's position was reduced to half-time) and the corporate executives claimed that physicians and hospital staff could just use the local university libraries. The claim was that everything is available online! We do have a handful of resources licensed for system-wide access but no one is responsible for marketing them or providing training on them. The corporate Medical Library intranet site that exists is not updated on a regular basis since no one is assigned to keep it current. Each hospital maintains their own library or libraryish intranet site so if

individual hospital library clients use the corporate site, they will not have access to all that their individual campus is licensing. As I said, it's a mess.

I am serving my first year as the appointed MLA Liaison to the Joint Commission and attended the 2012 JC Forum for Association Representatives. I could see many ways librarians could to help all represented associations help their hospitals comply with JC requirements for accreditation. Librarians, as we all know, could sure make a difference on many hospital committees if we were just given the opportunity to join them and had time to make the contributions that only librarians can make. The MLA HLS Hospital Library Standards Committee is writing a paper to support which committees a hospital librarian should be on to support the MLA Hospital Library Standards. This committee will present this paper as a poster at MLA13.

It appears to me that many groups are working on pulling together evidence to support hiring medical librarians to manage quality medical libraries in hospitals. I'm sure the results of the current efforts will be that more research is needed which means we need to create a way to submit what we are individually doing so that our efforts are joined and recorded as more evidence. How do we do that? We have many brilliant hospital librarians and non-hospital librarians in MLA interested in truly supported evidence-based medical/nursing/etc. practices that require professionally run medical libraries so I'm sure that working together we can find a way. Maybe we should have an open forum to discuss this at MLA each year. After all, the USA Healthcare System needs an overhaul. Quality patient care should be an option for all of us who will need it at some point in our lives. We have the knowledge to make a difference. We just need to figure out how to get the executive healthcare decision makers to look at our evidence and understand it. If we are all providing a 255% ROI, then it really costs hospitals more not to have a professionally run medical library!

And yes, a librarian is working at my hospital as the Director for Customer, Interpreter, and Volunteer Services. Our skills are truly valuable outside the library.

A couple of years ago I surveyed a number of supervisors in five hospitals in Wyoming. Although I focused on whether our students were prepared to search for information after leaving UW, I also wanted to know what resources were used in the state. Two of the hospitals had libraries (One has since been closed) and three did not have libraries.

The hospitals with libraries had, as expected, a substantial budget for databases and electronic and print subscriptions. The supervisors and their staff relied heavily on the librarian and the resources. They also were more familiar with resources that were available to them without charge. All ILLs were directed through the librarian, who utilized Free Share and other groups that would share resources.

The Hospitals without libraries had access to fewer resources, as expected. Specific departments purchased access to one subscription, such as LexiComp for pharmacy and one hospital had CINAHL for nursing. They might have access to Up-to-Date for physicians and Micromedex was also in use. One hospital pharmacy department were aware of, and using databases available through WYLD, a library consortium that provides databases through public and academic libraries. We have Cochrane and a few nursing databases. That department also used PubMed. The other two hospitals were unaware of the databases they could access at no charge, both through the state and NLM. They did not use PubMed, but relied on other sources, such as MedlinePlus. When an article was wanted, someone in the hospital (no one knew quite who that person was) would purchase the article directly from the publisher. They did not know about Loansome Doc, which would be available through Coe Library at UW.

Surprisingly, all the supervisors answered immediately that evidence based practice was used in their hospital.

Although this was only five hospitals in a very rural state with a small population, I would be surprised if access to information was much different in other hospitals without libraries.

Thanks for remembering that poster, Brenda. I compared the Healthgrades top hospitals with DocUser libraries. In that study I found that only 30% of the community hospitals in the US still had libraries. However, 72% of the community hospitals identified by Healthgrades as the top in quality measurements had hospital libraries. That is hugely statistically significant.

The date Healthgrades and the other quality monitoring groups comes from Medicare. I think that data can be accessed free of charge, as it is US government. I think it would be feasible to do a more formal study identifying which high quality hospitals have libraries and dig deeper to see how the library impacts quality of care.

The hospitals know in advance what Medicare is going to monitor, and I think the report is only for Medicare/Medicaid patients. I think this leaves some questions: Do the hospitals focus more on quality for the criteria that is reported? How does this bias the reporting and care? How are quality measured nationally for non-Medicare/Medicaid patients and is that data available? How is quality measured for unusual/rare cases?

I.e., institutions of proven quality have librarians, institutions with lesser quality do not have librarians, therefore institutions with librarians are likely to have superior quality.

I believe that a lot of data is collected and analyzed privately by organizations that only share with members, and a lot of data is deliberately not collected (due to the expense and due to the possibly unflattering results). Government data is low-hanging fruit, but it would be great if hospital librarians could discover and exploit their hospitals' access to additional data that is not publicly available.

Thanks for remembering that poster, Brenda. I compared the Healthgrades top hospitals with DocUser libraries. In that study I found that only 30% of the community hospitals in the US still had libraries. However, 72% of the community hospitals identified by Healthgrades as the top in quality measurements had hospital libraries. That is hugely statistically significant.

The data Healthgrades and the other quality monitoring groups comes from Medicare. I think that data can be accessed free of charge, as it is US government. I think it would be feasible to do a more formal study identifying which high quality hospitals have libraries and dig deeper to see how the library impacts quality of care.

The hospitals know in advance what Medicare is going to monitor, and I think the report is only for Medicare/Medicaid patients. I think this leaves some questions: Do the hospitals focus more on quality for the criteria that is reported? How does this bias the reporting and care? How are quality measured nationally for non-Medicare/Medicaid patients and is that data available? How is quality measured for unusual/rare cases?

How Data Collection and Ethics Intersect in Eliminating Health Disparities

The 2011 US Department of Health and Human Services standards for collection and reporting of data-which included lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgendered (LGBT) populations for the first time-are intended to help federal agencies refine their population health surveys in ways that will help researchers better understand health disparities and zero in on effective strategies for eliminating them. An invited speaker will address this issue. Librarians' emerging roles in data collection, management, and sharing make them valuable partners in this effort. Additionally, librarians' own research about health information-seeking behavior can benefit from these added data. Data is a key feature in ethical concerns for librarians that come into play when they face misleading public discussion or ideas or when they are asked to research something medically dubious, such as reparative therapy. Ideas based on prejudice or superstition can very easily become accepted as fact or basic assumption. What happens when the data or research that a librarian can provide counter that or provoke hostility? Proposals for presentations are invited about things that could range from the effects of bigoted public ideas about LGBT people in health provision, to pressures some librarians have felt about providing accurate consumer health information for politically loaded topics, to difficulties in serving a marginalized people in the face of public prejudice such as the Roma in Europe or undocumented persons in the United States.

1: Recruitment, Membership and Leadership in the Profession

Beatriz Varman wrote in the MLA-FOCUS March 21, 2013

on the value of joining Research Section (RS). The RS website has been updated

with a search feature and a volunteer form based on the section?s Google account (researchsectionmla at gmail.com).

The Awards program is one of our most successful

ways to identify MLA researchers who can engage with our section.? For the MLA 2013 meeting, there are 162 posters

RS submitted a proposal to the CE and Credentialing committees to recognize the CITI (Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative) courses on human participant research ethics.

RS collaborated with several sections and SIGs to offer diverse and reflective programming emphasizing research for our profession.? Co-sponsored sessions include: ?International Clinical Librarian Conference 2: Emerging Roles for Health Librarians and Finding New information in Novel Places?, which considers where the health librarian or informationist of the future will work, ?New Voices in an Interdependent World?, a session for current or recently graduated master?s or doctoral students, ?How Data Collection and Ethics Intersect in Eliminating Health Disparities?, which addresses standards for collection and reporting of data to include LGBT populations, and how data can inform research to eliminate health disparities, and ?Leading by Design, Not Default: Focused Direction in Support of the User?, which explores effective leadership approaches and subsequent evaluation, as well as innovations and their enhancements on workflow and customer reach.? We are lead on two programs, Cultural Differences in Scholarly Practice: Diversity in Creation, Dissemination, Use and Abuse of Intellectual Output??.? This program addresses cultural issues in scholarship, which include copyright, plagiarism, and access to content through a national university?s institutional repository.? The program entitled ?Librarians as Researchers: Practicing What We Preach in Scholarly Publications? ponders how librarians follow their own advice with regard to scholarly publication practices.??

4: Creating and Communicating our Knowledge

The MLA Research Agenda Committee developed a plan

for teams of librarian researchers to conduct systematic reviews on top-ranked
15 research questions produced by the Delphi study published in JMLA July 2012.

Over 200 volunteers, including librarians from Australia, Canada, and the UK responded. ?The 15 chairs of the teams have been appointed.? As of the April 11, 2013 initial conference call, the Committee will provide minimal oversight and recommendations to use existing widely-accepted guidelines. Otherwise the teams will refine their respective research question, conduct their literature reviews, and critical appraisals.? Each team will publish its systematic review in the peer reviewed literature.

Jonathan Eldredge will be presenting on the Research Agenda systematic review project at the 7th International Evidence Based Library and Information Practice (EBLIP7) Conference, July 15-18, 2013 in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada. He represented RS on the Programme Committee for this conference; full program

The team analyzing the Research Section Survey results will submit an article in May or June.? Select survey results related to Section will be posted on the RS website.

The editors of Hypothesis published two issues and drafted a plan to move in 2013-2014 to a journal format, re-establish the peer review board, and develop criteria for ?short article? submissions to better recruit presenters to submit a ?short article? on their presentations. RS will explore using MLA?s Web 2.0 technologies for research mentor or collaboration purposes.

I saw from the messages to the listserv that fellow librarians are working on this, I wanted to share some tips I have found that have worked for me:

1. The PA compliance monitor helps with identifying delinquent PI's. To be able to log in you should request from your institution's NIH research funding coordinator an eRA Commons account with PACR privileges.
2. In my experience about half the delinquent papers are 'owned' by about 10% of the PI's on the list. Tackle these multiple offenders first.
3. Visit PI's one-to-one in their office or lab, there is no substitute for the personal touch
4. Before you visit the PI, identify which papers the publisher can/will upload the pre-print manuscript on request. It helps when you meet with the PI if they can log into the NIHMS and approve a deposit because then they can see some progress immediately.
5. Encourage PI's to delegate their My NCBI bibliography to you but only so you can troubleshoot when they have questions. Establish your boundaries and encourage PI's to use their own resources (e.g. a Departmental secretary, grad student, or lab tech) to also be added as a delegate to add records to their bibliography moving forward - you do not have the time to do this for every NIH funded researcher in your institution.

6. When you talk to a PI use the opportunity to educate them about the four methods for getting papers into the NIHMS, about how certain publishers are better at helping authors than others, and encourage authors to negotiate upfront with publishers to retain their copyright using the SPARC addenda as the starting point.

7. Touch base with your institution's research compliance folks to get them to acknowledge the PI's ultimate responsibility for compliance. If your Office for Research holds a kick-off meeting with PI's, make sure they mention NIHPA as a line item on the compliance checklist they go through with the PI at the start of all NIH-funded research activities.

8. Keep a spreadsheet or copies of your email communications with PI's. Even with your best efforts in some cases the first the PI will become aware of this issue is when they try to submit an RPPR or form 2590 and are refused renewal. CYA.

("in vitro"[Publication Type]) AND "meta analysis as topic"[MeSH]

I also search "systematic review" AND "in vitro"[Publication Type]

I found 17544864 and 21562489 but they don't talk about using an established criteria.

This article 18782354 mentioned using MOOSE but it is really more diagnostic in reality.

She and I just want to make sure we aren't missing anything that would be useful in her evaluation. I think she will have to just develop her own data extraction categories as they did in 17544864 and 21562489 but I want to make sure.

This is part of a translational science research project so if anyone has anything please let me know. I will share with the list if there is interest.

Several asked for any responses I got to my question of a checklist for in vitro studies (lab based).

Paul Levett from Himmelfarb Health Sciences Library, George Washington University in Washington, DC told me that in the Systematic Review workshop at UPitt Med Ctr Falk Library they recommend using the PRISMA guidelines for reporting systematic reviews. I reported to my student they could use these guidelines and then possibly the University of Glasgow's checklist for Diagnosis or Harm/Causation <http://www.gla.ac.uk/researchinstitutes/healthwellbeing/research/generalpractice/ebp/checklists/#d.en.19536> to find information for extracting data. Either way I said she would need to probably create her own template to be used for each article. Paul mentioned that Himmelfarb has a LibGuide on Systematic reviews at <http://libguides.gwumc.edu/content.php?pid=252810&sid=2087176>.

Ruth Mitchell from Australia suggested that I look at Equator network <http://www.equator-network.org/resource-centre/library-of-health-research-reporting>. When clicking under Systematic Reviews a link to the CDC's HuGENet website comes up. They have a guide for doing reviews. Handbook of Systematic Reviews http://www.medicine.uottawa.ca/public-health-genomics/web/assets/documents/HuGE_Review_Handbook_V1_0.pdf They say on the website that "Authors should also apply the Venice guidelines http://www.cdc.gov/genomics/hugenet/file/print/pub_assessment.pdf to rate the credibility of cumulative evidence.

So I was happy this student asked this question because I did not know that HuGENet had its own method of evaluating the evidence and completing systematic reviews. I have the database bookmarked to search but never went to the CDC actual webpage for it.

Abstract

OBJECTIVES:

Based on 1984 data developed from reviews of medical records of patients treated in New York hospitals, the Institute of Medicine estimated that up to 98,000 Americans die each year from medical errors. The basis of this estimate is nearly 3 decades old; herein, an updated estimate is developed from modern studies published from 2008 to 2011.

METHODS:

A literature review identified 4 limited studies that used primarily the Global Trigger Tool to flag specific evidence in medical records, such as medication stop orders or abnormal laboratory results, which point to an adverse event that may have harmed a patient. Ultimately, a physician must concur on the findings of an adverse event and then classify the severity of patient harm.

RESULTS:

Using a weighted average of the 4 studies, a lower limit of 210,000 deaths per year was associated with preventable harm in hospitals. Given limitations in the search capability of the Global Trigger Tool and the incompleteness of medical records on which the Tool depends, the true number of premature deaths associated with preventable harm to patients was estimated at more than 400,000 per year. Serious harm seems to be 10- to 20-fold more common than lethal harm.

CONCLUSIONS:

The epidemic of patient harm in hospitals must be taken more seriously if it is to be curtailed. Fully engaging patients and their advocates during hospital care, systematically seeking the patients' voice in identifying harms, transparent accountability for harm, and intentional correction of root causes of harm will be necessary to accomplish this goal.

The Emerging Technologies Committee (ETC) for the Health Sciences Libraries at the University of Southern California is charged with investigating and integrating new technologies to improve library services.

Health sciences students enter their graduate programs with a variety of computing devices (laptops, tablets, and phones; Android, Windows, and Macintosh operating systems) and a wide variety of prior knowledge of web-based educational and social software. The library is interested in

determining what devices and software they are interested in and need instruction on in order to use library resources effectively.

In 2012, seven institutions throughout the country conducted this survey jointly. The ETC at USC has compiled all the data and have submitted a manuscript for publication. We plan to continue the survey longitudinally for several years to track changes in student behavior and knowledge.

The library plans to administer the survey* (https://uschs1.col.qualtrics.com/SE/?SID=SV_beb4R4kYVDB0Inz) in August and September 2013 to incoming students of the health professional degree programs.

We are looking for partners at other institutions who are interested in using this instrument to determine the use of technology by students in their health professional degree programs. Using the same instrument in a variety of schools will permit us to compare different programs and universities, potentially providing insight into commonalities and differences in technology adoption and comfort between student populations.

USC reserves the right to publish about the collective data first. We will acknowledge all of the librarians and institutions involved in collecting the survey data. After we publish the first article using collective data, we will share the collective data with all the participating institutions. All participating institutions may publish their own data any time they want. Of the different types of sources, the Internet holds the promise of timely and efficient searching.² Internet sites that are easy to scan, free of charge, appear to provide objective information, and have an email alert service were most attractive for horizon scanning.^{44,45} New Web sites were mostly found through word of mouth or through links from another site.⁴¹ Frequently, an information specialist prioritized new sites in an informal way. Sites may also be followed for a short period of time to determine whether the site should be included or excluded in the routine scanning activity. Sites that appear to produce more or a similar amount of useful information than sites that are already scanned were likely to be added to the list of sites to scan.^{44,45}"

I wish it mentioned more on the complex skills and knowledge needed to find much of the information used in horizon scanning but at least there is one mention.

Structured Abstract

Objectives. Since September 2010, under contract with the U.S. Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ), ECRI Institute has been establishing a national program to conduct horizon scanning of emerging health technology. The program's main purpose is to better inform investments in patient-centered outcomes research at AHRQ by systematically identifying and monitoring target technologies to create an inventory of technologies that have the highest potential for impact on clinical care, the health care system, patient outcomes, and cost. We conducted this study to identify existing best practices and effective methods for health technology horizon scanning and to provide input to AHRQ to optimize its horizon scanning program.

Methods. We performed a comprehensive search for both peer-reviewed and gray literature to identify existing horizon scanning methods for emerging health technologies. We searched major medical databases, including MEDLINE, EMBASE, CINAHL(r), PsycINFO(r), and the Cochrane Library. We also conducted targeted searches of digital libraries, relevant non-health-care-focused journals and databases, and the Web sites of the organizations that have extensive experience in technology horizon scanning or forecasting. We further sought input from a panel of experts and potential users of horizon scanning to identify additional methods. A two-day expert panel meeting was held in June 2011 to discuss the methods identified and potential approaches to incorporate the methods into AHRQ's horizon scanning process.

Results. Our search identified 23 formally established health technology horizon scanning programs, most of which are members of the International Information Network on New and Emerging Health Technologies (EuroScan). We also identified less structured horizon scanning activities performed by other entities, including U.S. government agencies and nongovernmental entities. These programs or activities often have different goals. As a result, their target technologies, time horizon of interest, and methods used for scanning or technology assessment may also vary. However, formally established programs share two sequential components in their horizon scanning process: (1) identification and monitoring of technologies of interest and (2) evaluation of potential impacts of the identified technologies. Most commonly used methods include searching a wide spectrum of sources-electronic and nonelectronic-to identify potential target technologies and seeking input from experts to prioritize or evaluate the technologies identified.

Conclusions. Existing horizon scanning programs use different methods to identify and assess emerging health technologies. The choice of the methods for AHRQ's horizon scanning program should be based on the goal, scope of work, time frame, and funding for the program. It appears that optimization of a horizon scanning program may take longer than a few years.

The EBLIP Conference is a biennial conference designed to promote the use of
best available evidence to improve library and information practice in
libraries of all types. It aims to bring together practitioners, researchers
and students involved in critical and reflective information practice to
think through new ways to address contemporary issues of evidence based
practice in less isolated, more collaborative, ways. The first EBL(IP)
Conference took place in Sheffield, UK in 2001. The success of this conference
led to further successful conferences in Edmonton (Canada, 2003), Brisbane
(Australia, 2005), Chapel Hill (USA, 2007), Stockholm (Sweden, 2009), Salford
(UK, 2011), and Saskatoon (Canada, 2013).

Brief details are as follows:

EBLIP Conferences typically last between 2.5 and 3 days. They are usually
accompanied by a Continuing Education Program of workshops of between 0.5 and
2 days duration. (The Continuing Education Program is optional for delegates
and is not included in the Registration fees for the Conference). A Social
Program typically includes a Welcome Reception and Conference Dinner (both
included in the Registration fees) and additional optional pay-as-you-go
social events. Day registration rates are generally provided to encourage
attendance by local participants.

Conference venues have previously included academic, hotel, and commercial
conference facilities. Local organizing committees (LOCs) should be
coordinated by a professional working in the public sector (e.g. academic,
public, school, national, professional organization). Conferences are run on

a not-for-profit basis with any surplus (after all deductions) being handed on to the successive local organizing committee. An exhibition of commercial sponsors may be organized as a necessary source of conference income.

The Conference Programme is the responsibility of the International Programme Committee (IPC) co-ordinated by an IPC Chair/Co-chairs working in liaison with the LOC. The Conference Program should include invited keynote speakers (whose travel, accommodation and registration is typically covered by conference income), submitted papers (abstracts) (selected by the IPC) and submitted posters (abstracts) (again selected separately by the IPC). Paper and poster abstracts should be reviewed by the IPC using a double-blind review process.

The EBLIP International Advisory Committee (IAC) comprising representatives from the previous hosts will select the venue for the conference based on submissions of Expressions of Interest from potential LOCs.

Abstract

Background

Modeling clinical processes (and their informational representation) is a prerequisite for optimally enabling and supporting high quality and safe care through information and communication technology and meaningful use of gathered information.

Objectives

The paper investigates existing approaches to clinical modeling, thereby systematically analyzing the underlying principles, the consistency with and the integration opportunity to other existing or emerging projects, as well as the correctness of representing the reality of health and health services.

Methods

The analysis is performed using an architectural framework for modeling real-world systems. In addition, fundamental work on the representation of facts, relations, and processes in the clinical domain by ontologies is applied, thereby including the integration of advanced methodologies such as translational and system medicine.

Results

The paper demonstrates fundamental weaknesses and different maturity as well as evolutionary potential in the approaches considered. It offers a development process starting with the business domain and its ontologies, continuing with the Reference Model?Open Distributed Processing (RM-ODP) related conceptual models in the ICT ontology space, the information and the computational view, and concluding with the implementation details represented as engineering and technology view, respectively.

Conclusion

The existing approaches reflect at different levels the clinical domain, put the main focus on different phases of the development process instead of first establishing the real business process representation and therefore enable quite differently and partially limitedly the domain experts? involvement.

The William H. Hannon Library has received a three-year grant from the Institute for Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to offer a nine-day continuing education opportunity for academic and research librarians. Each year, 21 librarians will receive instruction in research design and a full year of support to complete a research project at their home institutions. The summer Institute for Research Design in Librarianship (IRDL) is supplemented with pre-institute learning activities and a personal learning network that provides ongoing mentoring. The institutes will be held on the campus of Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles, California. The first institute will be held on June 16-26, 2014, with arrival on campus on Sunday, June 15, and departure on Friday, June 27.

We are now issuing a call for applications for the IRDL 2014. We are seeking novice librarian researchers who are employed by academic libraries, or research libraries outside an academic setting in the United States to participate in the institute. We define novice researchers as those who may have conducted research but have not yet had an article published or a

presentation accepted by a peer-reviewed publication or conference; librarians who have presented peer-reviewed poster sessions will be eligible. Librarians of all levels of professional experience are welcome to apply. We seek librarians with a passion for research and a desire to improve their research skills. The project is designed to bring together all that the literature tells us about the necessary conditions for librarians to conduct valid and reliable research in an institutional setting. The cohort will be chosen from a selective submission process, with an emphasis on enthusiasm for research and diversity from a variety of perspectives, including ethnicity and type and size of library.

The Advisory Committee, comprised of librarians with research experience in a variety of settings, will use an open review process to select participants who will travel to Los Angeles, California, participate in all institute activities, and conduct a research project during the 2014-2015 academic year. The online application requests a proposed research project that will be revised at the institute and will be the basis for the study to be completed in the coming year.

Selection criteria:

- * Significance of the research problem to the operational success of the applicant's library or to the profession of librarianship;
- * Clarity of the proposed methodology;
- * Enthusiasm for research and desire to learn;
- * Commitment to the year-long process of communicating with other participants and conducting the proposed study.

We will be accepting applications from December 1, 2013 to February 1, 2014. Scholars accepted to the Institute will be notified by March 1, 2014.
