Record acceleration in the growth of the health sciences knowledgebase, and the emergence of new technologies which will revolutionize the storage and communication of information, combine to promise a decade of unprecedented challenge and opportunity. But meeting this challenge, and managing new opportunities, will require increasing resources, broadening vision, and creative partnerships between institutions and sectors which have never before shared common perspectives, goals, or traditions. This part of Session I takes a practical look at the forces which will shape, and be shaped by, those entrusted with the guardianship of the health sciences knowledgebase in the years ahead. Effective coalitions on the national level can and must confront complex political and economic forces, but this process will require a judicious blend of new skills and technologies with the traditions and values which are the foundation of medical librarianship.

Coalition Building: Institutional Perspective

At Johns Hopkins University, the Welch Medical Library is striving to become more active within its institutional environment. A strategy for building institutional partnerships is explored and several examples of partnerships are highlighted: *The Clinical Workstation* project is designed to provide access to multiple, separate files. *The Curricular Information Database* grew out of an evaluation of gaps and overlaps of the School of Medicine's curriculum. Using inmagic, a specific subject index of topics is being developed. *The Mendelian Inheritance in Man Database*, through work with Victor McKusik, M.D. and NLM, is an online version of bibliographic and text material on Mendelian genetics.

We may view the responsibilities of clinical research as the transformation of observation into knowledge. The transfer of this knowledge to the end user has been managed by media, teachers, and librarians. Medical librarians have already expanded their role of enhancing knowledge access from books and journals to include online searching. The quantum leap to electronic publishing will involve some features of author-user interaction, access to dynamic knowledge bases, and user-driven publishing.

No single factor has had more impact on this evolution or offered more potential solutions than the microcomputer. And with those solutions, the role of the librarian at the interface between the end user and the medical information systems will continue to expand.
