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

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
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# INFORMATION The From Elsevier Science Publishers

Peer review is a valued tradition in scientific communication but it has recently come under increased attention and scrutiny. The second feature in Elsevier's **Information on Information** series, providing insights and perspectives on science publishing, supplies an inside look at peer review as it relates to the world's leading journal in neuroscience.

#### PEER REVIEW A Look at a Major Biomedical Journal: *Brain* Research

The growth of Brain Research since its launch in 1966 parallels the growth in neuroscience itself. For example, the Society for Neuroscience, the premier professional society in the field, was founded in 1973 with 300 members; there are now over 12,000. Today, Brain Research is the leading multidisciplinary vehicle for the dissemination of information on a broad spectrum of neuroscience topics, from molecular to behavioral studies. It publishes 10% of the world's literature devoted to primary research in the neurosciences, receiving some 3,000 papers per year from 50 countries, with the United States, United Kingdom and Japan currently the centers of intense research activity. In 1989, *Brain Research* published approximately 1,500 articles in 87 issues.

Editor-in-Chief, Dr. Dominick
Purpura, Dean of the Albert Einstein
College of Medicine, Bronx, NY, has
guided Elsevier's *Brain Research* for
many years. Dr. Purpura considers, "We
can expect stabilization in the field of
neurosciences but not in the immediate
future. Scientific and technological advances, particularly in molecular biology,
help maintain the research momentum.
This has seen parallel increases in funding, thus having a direct impact on the
number of manuscripts submitted to *Brain Research*."

#### THE REVIEWERS' ROLE

Maintaining a consistently high level of scientific excellence without jeopardizing a rapid publication schedule is a primary concern for Dr. Purpura, the Editorial Board and Elsevier, the publisher. Quality control through an efficient peer review process is the key. Although unpaid for their work, reviewers devote considerable time and effort to evaluating papers submitted to Brain Research. They recognize their role in peer review as an essential part of the scientific research process. The reviewers, who remain anonymous to the authors, perform several functions: to improve the scientific quality of the accepted papers; to guard against the dissemination of inferior or fraudulent work; to provide constructive criticism and guidance to authors of rejected papers and to help educate less experienced members of their peer group.

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
Without exception, every paper is scrutinized via the peer review process administered by the editorial office located at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine. Dr. Purpura and two experienced editorial assistants, Patricia Stokes and Josephine DeBrino, effectively traffic the 250 manuscripts that arrive every month, aided by a sophisticated computer-based tracking system. Full-length papers are sent to at least two referees carefully selected from a base of 2,000 possible international reviewers; short communications such as letters articles are forwarded to one reviewer to speed publication. The total Brain Research review process takes four to six weeks.

Following review, only 4% of submitted papers are accepted and published as originally written; 50% of the manuscripts are rejected. The remaining 46% are returned to the authors to consider and incorporate the reviewers' suggestions for subsequent reconsideration by the reviewers and editor-in-chief. In almost every instance, the reviewers prepare extensive and detailed evaluations. Their guidance helps to improve the quality of the work presented and sometimes even prompts investigators to redesign experiments.

#### **ELECTRONIC PROCESSING**

As Brain Research continues to move into the electronic information age, manuscript handling and review are being further streamlined to ensure faster processing and more systematic selection of reviewers. The names and addresses of the 2,000 active reviewers, along with key words representing their areas of expertise, have been placed into a computer database. Some authors have also begun to facilitate faster manuscript processing by submitting articles on floppy disk

The scope and costs associated with an effective peer review process, a value-added function, may not be immediately perceived by subscribers, but the result is — the publication of a journal with the highest scientific standards. Thus, the scientific community and those who serve and work with it are assured of information that is relevant, timely, reliable and conforms to exacting quality standards.



The others are actually requests to be handled or decided by the presiding officer.

#### PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

Precedence means the priority or order in which motions must be proposed, considered, and disposed of. The purpose of assigning a rank or order to each commonly used motion is to enable an assembly to propose, consider, and decide each motion without confusion. From the highest ranking to the lowest ranking, the order of precedence is:

#### Privileged Motions

- 1. Adjourn
- 2. Recess
- 3. Question of privilege

#### Subsidiary Motions

- 4. Postpone temporarily (or table)
- 5. Close debate
- 6. Limit debate
- 7. Postpone indefinitely
- 8. Refer to committee
- 9. Amend

#### Main Motions

10. The main motion and specific main motions

Incidental motions have no order or precedence. Since they must be decided as soon as they arise, they present no problem of precedence.

There are two basic rules of precedence:

- When a motion is being considered, any motion of higher precedence may be proposed, but no motion of lower precedence may be proposed; and
- Motions are considered and voted on in reverse order of their proposal. The motion last proposed is considered and disposed of first.

#### MAJOR PURPOSES OF MOTIONS

Motions may be grouped according to the purpose to be accomplished.

To introduce business	
To approve action	move to accept, adopt, or ratify
To modify or change	move to amend or refer to a committee
To deter action	move to postpone to a definite time, refer to a committee, or lay on table
To limit discussion	move the previous
To determine correctness	question after a voice vote or show of hands, a "call for a division," i.e., a
To suppress a question	
	indefinitely or lay on table
To object to decision	move an appeal from the decision of the chair
To make a request	call for point of information, rise to parliamentary inquiry, or raise a question of privilege
To consider a second time	
To repeal action	move to rescind

#### PRINCIPAL RULES GOVERNING MOTIONS

Rules governing motions generally answer the following questions:

- 1. What is the precedence of the motion?
- 2. Can the motion interrupt a speaker?
- 3. Does the motion require a second?
- 4. Is the motion debatable?
- 5. Can the motion be amended?
- 6. What vote does the motion require?
- 7. To what other motions can the motion apply?
- 8. What other motions can be applied to the motion?

## **Parliamentary Procedures**

PARLIAMENTARY RULES ARE established to aid organizations in the orderly, expeditious, and equitable accomplishment of their business. And, because order and good will are essential to the process of working together and accomplishing common goals, it is essential that association members have an understanding and working knowledge of parliamentary procedure. The following overview is offered as a guide to participation in business meetings of the Medical Library Association.

#### PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

As provided for in the Bylaws of the Medical Library
Association (Article XIII, Section I), rules in the current
edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (1990
edition) shall govern the association in all cases where they
are applicable and consistent with the bylaws of the
association.

#### **RULES OF THE ASSEMBLY**

The following rules govern the conduct of MLA business meetings:

#### The Floor

When addressing the chair, the person desiring recognition moves to a microphone and gives proper identification, including name and institution, as well as city and state; only MLA members are permitted to speak on the floor of the assembly.

#### Motions

According to the MLA Bylaws (Article II, Section 8), main motions (those introducing new business) may be brought to the assembly only if written copies have been distributed at or before the meeting to each voting member present or by unanimous consent of voting members present.

#### Resolutions

Similarly, resolutions should always be brought in written form and distributed to all voting members present.

#### Debate

Debate is limited to three minutes for each speaker; no speaker may have the floor twice on the same question until all who wish to speak have spoken.

#### Quorum

A quorum of 5% (of the voting members) is required for the transaction of business. For purposes of determining a quorum, a person eligible to cast two votes is counted as two voting members.

#### Voting

To facilitate the counting of votes, voting paddles are provided to all eligible voters attending the annual meeting. Voting paddles are color-coded to distinguish institutional and regular members.

By general consent, if there is no objection, or by a twothirds vote, any of the foregoing rules may be suspended.

#### UNDERSTANDING MOTIONS

Classes of Motions

Motions are classified according to their purposes and characteristics into four groups:

- 1. Main motions: The main motion brings substantive proposals before the assembly for consideration and action.
- Specific main motions: There are three main motions that have specific names and are governed by somewhat different rules. They are referred to as "specific" main motions to distinguish them from the main motion. These are:

Rescind
Resume consideration--take from the table

3. Subsidiary motions: Subsidiary motions alter the main motion or delay or hasten its consideration. Consequently, they are subsidiary to it. The most frequently used subsidiary motions are:

> Postpone temporarily--place on the table Close debate (on a previous question) Limit debate Postpone indefinitely Refer to a committee Amend

4. Privileged motions: Privileged motions have no direct connection to the main motion before the assembly. They are motions of such urgency that they are entitled to immediate consideration. The privileged motions are:

> Adjourn Recess Question of Privilege

5. Incidental motions: Incidental motions arise only incidentally out of business before the assembly. They do not relate directly to the main motion but usually to the way in which business is being conducted. Because of this, they may interrupt business and are handled as soon as they arise. Incidental motions include:


Appeal from a decision of the chair Consider informally Suspend the rules Point of order Parliamentary inquiry Withdrawal of a motion Division of a question Division of the assembly

The first three listed are motions. Therefore they require a second and are decided by a vote of the assembly.

### SAFETY TIPS

If the door is hot, do not leave your room. Seal the cracks with wet towels, phone for help, and wait.

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
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
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
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
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#### WELCOME TO THE MLA 90TH ANNUAL MEETING


