Develop Your Message:

As you prepare to meet with your congressional representatives, collect the following information from [MLANET's Public Policy Center](#):

- Background information about relevant issues
- Talking points
- Recommendations
- Links to relevant information
- Fact sheets and other helpful resources

Write Your Message:

The most effective ways to send your message are:

- **Written message:** Email is faster; US mail takes weeks due to security screening
- **Phone calls:** Ask for the staff member who handles health care issues; have your message prepared before the call; and be prepared to leave a message
- **Meet in person:** Invite congressional staff for a tour of the library and an overview of programs and services, including those supported through federal funding.

Congress.gov allows you to search for bill text for current and past sessions of Congress, bill summaries and status, committee websites (e.g., Appropriations Committee), house and senate roll call votes, and more.
