In our Toolkit - A column for Resources New and Cool

This column highlights useful, cool, or new resources including websites, monographs, OA sources, subscription resources/databases, etc. that NAHRS members find helpful to their work.

Tool: Elicit (classic: old.elicit.org updated: elicit.com)

Recommended for: Anyone starting a literature review

In a Nutshell: Looking for a generative AI research assistant to help locate relevant articles, but not sure you want to recommend the variable quality sources and potentially made-up citations of ChatGPT? Elicit uses similar algorithms as ChatGPT to respond to research questions, but it was trained specifically on data from over 200 million scholarly journal articles from the Semantic Scholar database, which includes citations from PubMed and several other top health sciences publishers.

Elicit uses machine learning language models to help with: finding papers, extracting key claims, summarizing results, brainstorming ideas, and more. Enter a topic or question and Elicit will retrieve and rank articles from its dataset and generate a custom summary from the top results. Star relevant articles and Elicit will use forward and backward citation search-

ing to bring you even more matching citations. Elicit utilizes links to free full text from Unpaywall, and it can even begin to extract key data from

studies, such as intervention, sample size, and outcome measured. A newer version, located at Elicit.com, includes more features such as discovering concepts across papers and extracting information from PDFs.

Both models of Elicit use a system of credits users can purchase to run various processes; however, users are given 5,000 free credits when they sign up, equaling about 60 searches on old.elicit.org.
