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In our Toolkit - A column for Resources New and Cool

This column highlights useful, cool, or new resources including websites, monographs, OA sources, subscription resources/databases, etc. that NAHRS members find helpful to their work.

Tool: Consensus (https://consensus.app)

Recommended for: Anyone who wants quick answers to life's questions that are supported by scholarly articles

In a Nutshell: Marketed as an "AI Search Engine for Research", Consensus promises to help you "find and understand the best science, faster." Simply enter questions that can be answered in a yes/no format or ask the relationship between two concepts, and Consensus will sift through over 500 journals, university presses, and scholarly society websites to answer your questions without hallucinating results or citing imaginary sources.

Consensus uses large language models, Vector search technology, citation count, velocity of citations, study design, publication date, and




other factors to predict the most relevant results and summarize the findings of the top 10 papers in one sentence. Depending on the type of question you ask, Consensus can also extract key data from the articles and show you how many of those papers agree on their findings with the Consensus meter. Consensus can generate credible sources for literature reviews for novice and expert researchers alike.

The free version of Consensus includes unlimited searches, research quality indicators, AI-powered filters, but you may want to subscribe to Consensus Premium for unlimited access to ChatGPT-4 summaries, the Consensus meter, study snapshots, and the Copilot AI assistant, which can

greatly expedite the process of understanding, implementing, and sharing your findings. Students are eligible for a significant discount on Consensus.
